

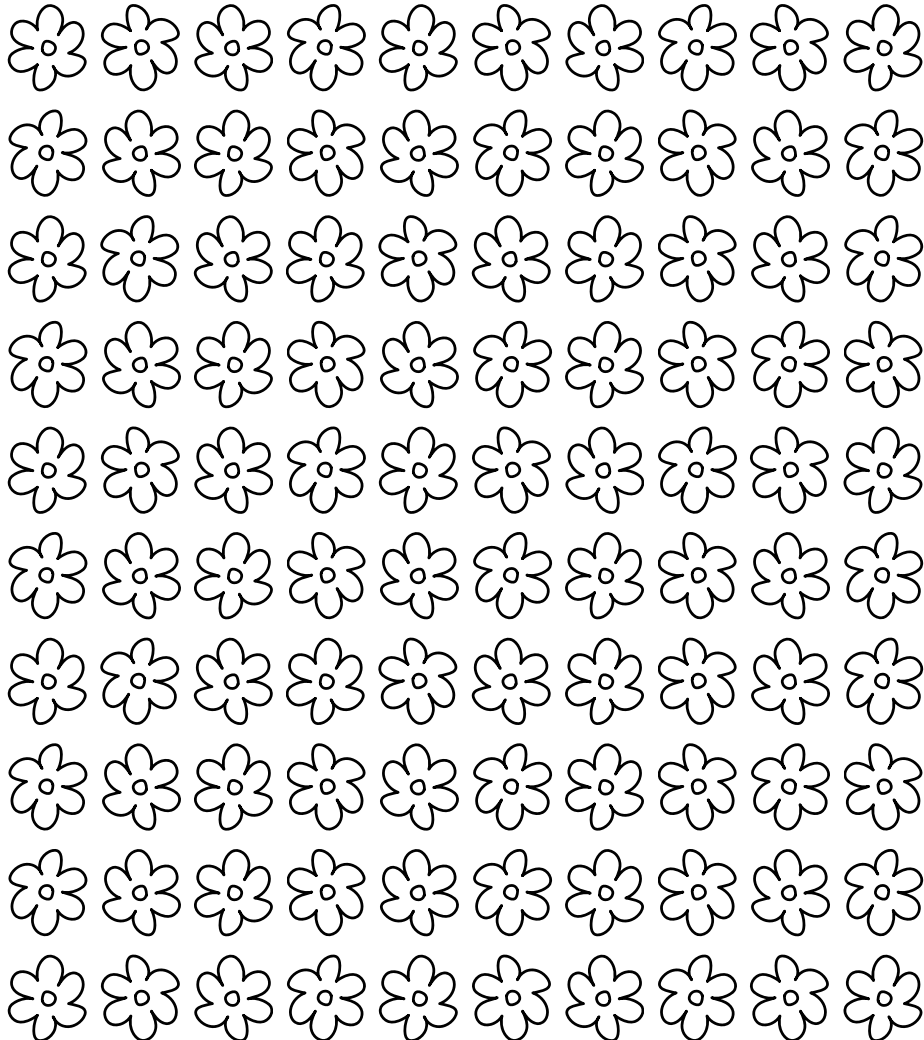

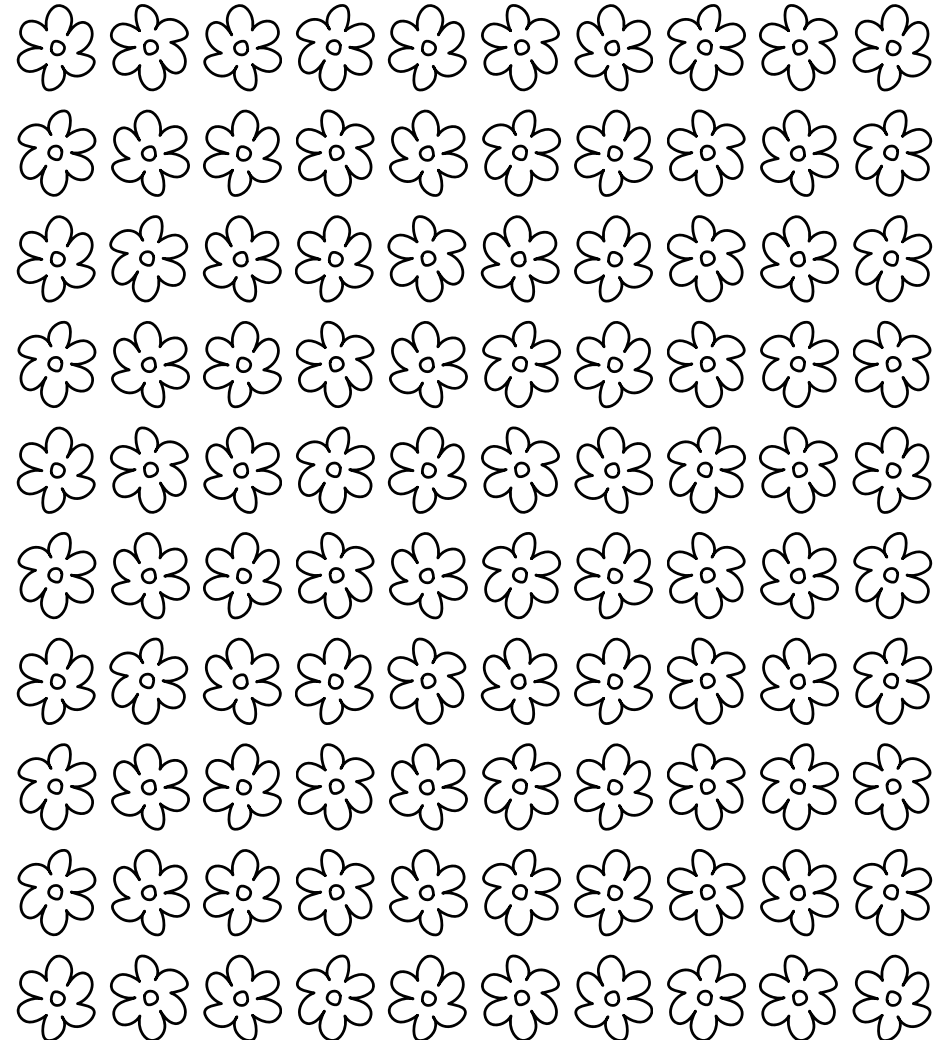

Scribble, Scribble

Help your child experiment with writing using pencils, crayons, markers, and chalk on different kinds of paper and cardboard.
